Elections in March


March is when we elect club officers. There were no new volunteers so the 2024 officers will continue through 2025. New is the office of Co-Treasurer.

The Club Library Materials

In April we will start raffling off materials in the club library. The April items will be:

- 1. <u>Favorite Bird Patterns</u> by Alfred M. Ponte. It has very detailed info on lots of birds with feather patterns, for example, "Top of Tail" and "Bottom of Tail." It's a good reference. The library has two of this book. The second one will be raffled later.
- How to Draw Bears published by Walter T. Foster. Twenty-six pages of pictures and line drawings.
- 3. <u>20 REALISTIC GAME AND SONG BIRDS, WOOD CARVING PATTERENS</u> by George Lehmane. Big book with lots of details.
- **4.** How to draw and paint HOOFED ANIMALS by Walter J. Wilwerding. Artistic renderings, line drawings, skeletons and antlers.
- HOW TO CARVE FISH CARVING BASICS by Curtis J. Badger. Band sawing, carving, mounting eyes, wood burning, lots of photos on the carving process on 85 pages.
- **6. AN INTRODUCTION TO BIRDS** by John Kieran with illustrations by Don Eckelberry. This has information on each bird. Hardbound with 77 pages.
- 7. <u>HABITAT BIRD CARVING BASICS</u> by Curtis J. Badger. This focuses on making the habitat, including moss, mushrooms, grass, leaves, show, ice and rain. [Note for Sandy Czajka: it includes making and soldering branches using brass and copper wire. If you didn't win it, you could borrow it.] 85 pages.
- PAINTING BIRD CARVING BASICS by Curtis J. Badger. 82 color pages on painting birds.
- HOW TO PAINT TROPICALS FISH CARVING BASICS by Curtis J. Badger. 84 color pages on painting.
- 10. HOW TO PAINT TROUT FISH CARVING BASICS by Curtis J. Badger. 86 color pages on painting.
- **11.** CHECKERING AND CARVING OF GUNSTOCKS by Monty Kennedy. There are articles for each gun written by different authors. Included are patterns, tools, making special tools. Hardbound with 334 pages. This is a serious reference book.
