Buckeye Woodcarvers Roundup

• The Roundup occurs every July, running a Wednesday through Saturday. It's different. The roundup is in Fletcher, Ohio, a bit north of Dayton. There are around a dozen instructors and some are world class. You pay only \$30 for all four days plus you pay material costs and a tip for the instructor. You can come any day or come every day. You can stay with one instructor or move around. It's informal – most classes are in a building with a dirt floor. Fans are in open wall panels but no air conditioning.
